Ulf regrets having to leave Arizona

"My name is Ulf and I come from Sweden," is the familiar greeting one gets from Ulf Jannsen, foreign exchange student to Globe from Alvesta, Sweden. Ulf has stayed with Mr. and Mrs. Rex Wilson and their three sons, Kendall, Joel, and David on Crestwood Drive in Globe. David, a senior at GHS is Ulf's American brother. And as all good things must come to an end, so Ulf must leave Arizona for his homeland soon. He will depart from Albuquerque, New Mexico, on June 29 for a guided tour across the United States. He will arrive in and leave New York on July 15 and arrive in Sweden two days after his departure.

Ulf has found Globe, "an interesting place with all different kinds of people." He said he has enjoyed the town and especially his family very much.
