

Howard, mile relayers pace Tiger tracksters

Mike Howard set a state AA record in the long jump at the state championships to top off a successful season for the thin-clads. His leap of 21 feet 6½ inches was an inch better than the existing record but half a foot less than his season best.

The mile relay team clocked 3:27:8 for a second in that event. The team consist of Vir-Ralph Warner, and Howard. For them it was their fastest time of the season, but at state Agua Fria beat them out by four tenths of a second.

Globe's only other entry in the state tourney was the 440 yard relay team, which consisted of Ed Casillas, Stephens, Howard and Anspach. It just wasn't their day as they ran a 45.8 good only for seventh place.

Next year's outlook appears to be more than just hopeful as there are few that won't be

back. Although some of this year's mainstays will be leaving, such as Anspach, Stephens, and Casillas, there is a great deal of depth.

Howard will be back as will one of this year's biggest disappointments. That being Tom Herrington, a hurdle specialist that was forced out of competition due to an injury shortly before divisionals. A first in the high and low hurdles at state next year is within reach, barring problems.

The depth in our relay teams can be best shown by comparison. In dual meets this year the J.V. times for both relays were better than those of the Miami varsities.

Sophomore John Marcanti should develop into one of the finest weight men around the state, and with an abundance of talent, the track team next year might bring home more trophies than this year.

Baseballers end season at 2-13
